Principal's Message

Aloha Parents/Guardians and members of the Waimea High School Community,

At the beginning of the second quarter we welcomed Mrs. Anne Kane as our Vice Principal. Mrs. Kane comes to us via Kapaa Middle School, where she served as Vice Principal for the past four years. Her educational background is in the fields of science and mathematics. We look forward to her sharing her knowledge with our faculty, staff, and students.

Mrs. MaeLynn Ikeda, who graciously served as the Acting Vice Principal for the first quarter returned to her teaching position within the social studies department. A heartfelt thank you goes out to her for the passion and energy she put into her work.

Our first semester is quickly drawing to an end. Athletically Waimea High garnered three KIF Championships: Girls Volleyball, Boys Air Riflery and Cheerleading. Our football team gave our supporters an exciting conclusion to the KIF season and kept our fans on the edge of their seats winning our Homecoming game and giving Kauai High a scare for their homecoming game.

Academically our seniors will breathe a sigh of relief as they complete their research papers, the first of three phases of their Senior Project. The sophomores are in the process of taking the first of three attempts to exhibit their proficiency with the Hawaii State Assessment (HSA), forty five percent have already shown their proficiency in Reading. The HSA is now administered online and students are able to see their test result at the conclusion of their testing session. There are three subjects being tested for HSA, they are Mathematics, Reading and Science. The two that will determine if we meet Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) are still Mathematics & Reading. This year the target for proficiency has been raised, for Mathematics it is now 64% and Reading is set at 72%. The science portion is still being field tested and scores achieved will become our baseline data.

A second online test our students will encounter is Data for School Improvement (DSI). DSI was introduced this year and after a rocky start it is now operational and ready for our use. Mathematics and English Language Arts teachers now have a formative assessment tool at their finger tips. There is a bank of 10,000+ items which are aligned to our standards /benchmarks. Teachers are able to select the standards they want to asses and create an assessment utilizing these items manually or allow the system to create it electronically.

We are definitely into the 21st Century, our students are digital learners and it is imperative that we make the changes in our educational system to meet their needs. To quote our newly appointed State Superintendent Kathryn Matayoshi, "Hawaii's Race to the Top plan maps out a strong foundational framework for targeted and systemic education reforms. Our schools and educators will work with our education partners to accelerate growth in student achievement. We have made significant progress in demonstrating our capacity to make a bold transformation and we will continue to move forward with a sense of urgency to bolster the success of our students in college, career, and life." Dear Parents and Guardians,

Recently there has been increased violation by WHS students of several longstanding policies.

The Waimea Matters presentation, the home /school compact, and chapter 19 are all on our school web site and outline behavior expectations for all students at Waimea High School. Please review these with your students. At the beginning of the school year behavior expectations were reviewed with all WHS students during advisory classes.

The use of cell phones and other electronic devices during academic time has increased and is a concern to the administration team. Waimea matters is very specific on this; "...electronic devices will be automatically confiscated if used during class time... have the authority to enforce this (electronic equipment) policy even if used while going to the bathroom, counselors. etc".

Electronic Devices are only allowed before/after school hours, during recess or lunch, and during the 5 minute passing between classes. All other time is considered academic time, especially Advisory period.

Students have been reminded that if they are out of class during academic time they must have a valid pass.

Students out of class without a pass are truant. According to Chapter 19 truancy is defined as "... A student is absent from class(es) or the school campus with out authorization..." Our School Resource Officer is booking repeat offenders for truancy and escorting them home in the police car.

Inappropriate Language consequences are clearly outlined in Waimea Matters "Students who use inappropriate language directed at any adult staff member will be suspended". Repeat offenders may also be charged with Harassment by the School Resource Officer and escorted home in the police car.

Students often need reminders of the behavior expectations. We appreciate your assistance in this matter.

RESULTS OF BULLYING SURVEYS

Mrs. Ayon's 11th grade Expository Writing classes studied many articles on the topic: "Bullying," this semester. Students formed groups and designed their own bullying surveys to distribute at Waimea High. We asked students and adults to fill out if bullying in various forms such as: teasing, name calling, hitting, racial, sexual, gender harassment is a major issue on our campus.

We randomly selected 25 students and 15 adults. The following are our results by percents from Below are sample questions that we asked on our surveys.

Students:	Yes	No
Have you ever been teased and called names?	76%	24%
Has the teasing made you feel insecure?	56%	44%
Has the teasing, name calling lowered your self esteem?	48%	52%
Have you ever asked for help or advice?	76%	24%

These percents showed us that bullying /name calling rank the highest in the types of bullying there are.

A student's self esteem goes down and they feel insecure about who they are. By comparison, the survey shows that on campus bullying is taken seriously because students seek help and advice for the bad feelings.

When you were growing up, were you ever bullied?	75%	0%	25%
Have you seen teasing on WHS campus?	100%		
Have you stepped in to stop the teasing/harassment?	100%		
Have you counseled /helped a student with this issue?	100%		
Do you think bullying is a major issue in school?	88%	0%	12%

These percents showed our group that adults have also experience bullying as children. The next three questions about witnessing bullying in the form of teasing and verbal harassment ranked 100% among adults at WHS. Also, the percents showed that adults were there 100% for the students whenever the teasing type of bullying happened to them.

Overall, the surveys showed us that students say physical bullying such as hitting, fighting are done in a lesser degree than teasing/name calling is. The results from the adults show us that they make sure they help a student out when they are aware of the issue.

The Menehune Battalion Cadets Stay Involved

This past October the Waimea Menehune Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) program completed their annual Federal Inspection. The JROTC battalion staff's superb performance in their staff briefing and the entire battalion's performance contributed to the achievement of Honor Unit with Distinction; a mark of excellence since 1997. This achievement enables Major (retired) Victor Aguilar to nominate cadets for appointments to the various military academies.

The Menehune Battalion participated in the Annual Kauai Veteran's Day Parade on November 6th where cadet Rachel Coyaso presided as Ms Kauai Veterans. It was the first time 75 cadets marched in unison down through the town of Kapaa demonstrating cohesion and teamwork. The JROTC cadets were again asked to support the Elelee School Veterans Day program on November 10th. The cadets provided a Color Guard, Drill Team and a trio of buglers to play TAPS to honor those who have fallen. On November 11th the cadets set up flags in the towns of Waimea and Kekaha to promote the public display of flags on Veterans' Day. Later the same day, selected cadets participated in the Veterans' Day ceremony held at Hanapepe Cemetery with the Menehune Color Guard, Honor Guard and a trio of buglers who performed Taps.

At the national JROTC Leadership Academic Bowl (JLAB) last school year, the leadership team consisting of Kimberly Aguilar, Jasmine Cardenas, Branden Gatioan and Kendra Ishida placed 8th at the competition in Virginia and are hoping to repeat their performance this year. Both our leadership and academic teams have done well this year scoring first and third respectively in the state and have been selected to participate in phase II of JLAB in February. The leadership team scored an 82, followed by five schools which all scored a 73. Our academic team scored a 65, tying with Hilo High School, just shy of the 1st place score of 68 by Waianae. Lastly, visits to St. Theresa and Waimea Canyon Middle School were made on the 22nd and 24th to assist in registration options for the incoming freshmen.

December started with the presentation of the colors at the Mayor's Inaugural Ceremony on December 1st. The menehune battalion was again given the privilege of leading the annual Lights on Rice Parade on December 3rd. The JROTC helped at the Kekaha Christmas Festival by presenting the colors as well as performing with the Drill Team on December 8th and will be ready to present to incoming freshmen parents the night of December 9. The last major event in December is the Waimea Lights Parade on December 18 where the Menehune Battalion will be marching as well as selling Chinese pretzels to fund raise for future events.

School Emergency Information for Parents and Guardians

The Hawaii State Department of Education is committed to providing a safe environment for students, staff, and visitors. We work closely with national, state, and local safety officials such as Police, Fire, Emergency Medical Services, Emergency Managements Agencies and the Department of Health to ensure our school are well prepared in the event of an emergency. Each school conducts drills throughout the school year to help students and staff prepare for possible emergencies.

How you can help - Be Prepared for a school emergency - (*) Ensure that your child's emergency contact information is accurate and current (*) All DOE school have emergency plans. Become familiar with your school's emergency plan and parent/guardian reunification procedures in the event of a school evacuation.

In Case Of A School Emergency - Although your first reaction would be to call or rush to your child's school, please follow the tips listed below. (*) **DO NOT** call or rush to your child's school. Phone lines and staff are needed for emergency response efforts. (*) **DO NOT** phone your child. Staff and students are discouraged from using cell phone communication for safety reasons. (*) Tune in to local TV/Radio stations for official school news alerts. (*) Rely only on official communication from school or public safety officials. (*) Listen for official information regarding reunification with your child. Students will be released ONLY to parents/guardians who are documented as emergency contacts and who present a picture ID such as a driver's license, military ID or passport. (*) Go the DOE website: doe.k12.hi.us for emergency updates.
